My Friends, Easter is Here



In Luke's gospel on Sunday morning all Jesus' friends and family were trying to cope as best they could. Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary, the mother of James, decided to do what they would normally do. They would carry out the ritual of anointing the body. Rituals are to remind and comfort us in times like these. I'm sure they felt just a bit calmer and more in control carrying on and conducting the ritual as a coping mechanism.

As if they had not already endured enough shock and surprise the previous days, the women now entered the tomb and found it empty. Questions and concerns had to start flooding them. 
The Angels asked," Why are you looking among the dead for someone who is alive? HE isn't here! HE is risen from the dead!" Then the women remembered what Jesus had told them. We are exiting from the shock and loss of Covid, albeit very slowly. We've tried rituals and numerous other things as coping mechanisms at this time when we know we have had no control in our lives. We are worn down and worn out. Our nerves are frayed, and we have very little trust that we are being fed accurate information from almost any direction.




Women's Book Group

Staying Strong During the Pandemic A Devotion for Youth

I can do all things through Christ, who gives me strength. Phil 4:13

We've been through a lot in the past year. We have a tradition in our Youth Group that we share our joys or concerns, our highs and our lows. This past year you may have experienced some of your lowest lows. I'm going to be honest. It's been a tough year for me. I've hit some pretty low points. I live with depression anyhow. And the isolation, being away from all of you and everyone else at church, as well as my own family, just made it worse. Then, one of my brothers passed away unexpectedly in August. It was rough.

Now, I take medication for my depression, and I see a counselor. But, even those tools were not enough to keep from feeling blue some days. And yet, even on those days when I was feeling the lowest, I knew there were four things I could count on: My wife, my son, my dog, and God. I want to break those down a little bit here. Now I know most of you, and I hope all of you, come from pretty solid families, so you can count on your parents and your siblings to help you out if you're feeling down. That's what we've been talking about during our Youth Chats – building that circle of trust when we're struggling with difficult feelings like anxiety and depression.

Now, there's nothing wrong with feeling anxious or depressed. I don't mean they're difficult because they're wrong. But, they're difficult because they are strong feelings, they are powerful emotions. And, sometimes, they can overwhelm us.

And having people we can talk to about our feelings, having someone we can turn to when we're struggling, can make a huge difference. It can really help a lot. And the adults who help run the Youth Program at church want you to know you can reach out to any of us at any time. We're here for you. So, how many of you have a dog? Or a cat? Or some other animal you can talk to when things are rough? Or just cuddle with them when you're feeling down? Scientific studies have shown that having a furry creature that you pet and snuggle with helps boost your mood. So, if you're feeling bad, take some time to love on the critters in your house – if you have them

Now, take a look at the cartoon that's with this article. Of course, God is not really a dog. But, I think it is true that dogs do exhibit some of the same characteristics we see in God. In Philippians 4:13, Paul writes, "I can do all things through Christ, who gives me strength." Think about that for a minute. We spend a lot of time at church and Youth Group talking about the fact that God is always with us and always loves us, no matter what. That love was shown most fully through Jesus Christ. Now, with this quote from Paul, we see that in addition to Jesus Christ loving us, he is also walking with us every day, and will give us strength when we face tough times. That's what I want you to remember most from this devotion. That in addition to loving us and caring for us, Jesus Christ also helps us get through the rough stuff.

We've had a rough year with the pandemic, and we've still got a ways to go before it's completely over. But, even in these tough times, Jesus Christ has been with us. And will continue to be with us. To help us. To love us. And to give us strength. So – remember – you and me? We're not alone in this. When we feel tired, when we feel weak, when we feel worn out – whether it's from the pandemic or any other difficult thing we are facing – we can count on Jesus to love us. And to give us strength and help carry us through the tough times.

Thank you for all the ways in which you care for us. Thank you for giving us the strength to face anything and everything – no matter how difficult it may seem. We're going through a lot right now, and we appreciate all that you have done to help us so far.
